Another project we will undertake this year is to set up a library. Since our Chinese Language School has been selected as a Model School, the Chinese Consulate-General generously donated many Chinese reference books to us. Thus, we plan to set up a library in our office so that members can come to share in the joy of reading. Hereby I have to thank Ms. Kamy Cheng to letting us use her van unconditionally. I also thank Mr. Patrick Ng for loading and unloading 64 heavy cartons of books.

The Association began as a small group of people with similar visions and aspirations. It now has over 700 financial members, and the Chinese Language School has more than 130 students. We are no longer a small, closed group of individuals and acquaintances. It is a

very different organization now and its growth inevitably means more formality is needed in the way that the CCCA is governed, right from our constitution down to how activities operate.

In December 2015, the Association received an outstanding invoice (July to September 15) for hiring the Cherrybrook Technology High School MPC used by the Badminton Group. As with previous practice, the activity group leader who collected money from group members on behalf of the Association should pay all expenses in due course and bank the balance into the CCCA's bank account. It is not our intention to control or interfere with activity groups' operations but we have to minimize any risk that the CCCA might encounter. This recent event served as a reminder that regulations in the constitution are there for good reasons.

Since the Association's incorporation, our constitution, the governing framework, has not been updated. Although it is not one hundred percent consistent with the current environment, it should still be followed until a new one is put in place. We are duty bound and committed to act in accordance with the Constitution of the CCCA especially in the area of financial management. More structured governance is required for the Association to ensure smooth operations and a strong financial position.

From now on, the CCCA Constitution will be diligently enforced, especially regulation 15.4 which requires all monies received by the Association to be deposited into the Association's bank account promptly. In other words, leaders of all activity groups within the Association who collect money from their group members on behalf of the Association must bank all the money received. During the past two years, only the Seniors Group had been submitting financial reports on a regular basis.

Finally, I hope you would help us to do the right thing - save the environment. Every quarter we print more than 500 hard copies of our newsletter. Although we have limited the number of pages to less than 16, on average we use four A3 pages for each copy of the newsletter. In other words, every three months we will use at least 4000 sheets of A4 paper and 16,000 sheets a year. A few years ago we encouraged members to receive the newsletter by email. Being a responsible Association, from the next issue we will email a link to our newsletter to those members who have given us their email addresses. We understand some members are not used to the electronic copies and thus hard copies will still be posted to them and made available in the office for members to pick up.

Treasurer's Report Hon. Treasurer Edward Lam

For the months of July to December 2015 (the account for the month of December was prepared up to 10 December as Daisy Wong was then on leave), the Association received (1) a grant of \$11,634 from the Department of Education and Training in October and (2) bank interest of \$6,649 from the maturity of \$184,700 one-year term deposit in early December. The operating surplus (after adjustment) was \$2,202.92.

After the transfer of funds for daily operations into the bank accounts of the Association and the Chinese Language School, the amount for the term deposit renewal is \$165,000, a reduction of \$19,700 as compared with last year.

In today's low interest environment, we need to work hard to maintain funds for normal operations.

#### **Lantern Night 2015**

The income from various food stalls at the Lantern Night held on 25 September 2015 was \$8,261, which was less than half of the sales (\$18,188) in 2014.

The cost of goods sold, for every dollar of sales, was 47 cents for 2015, compared with 35 cents for 2014.

The ex-treasurer advised her laptop was damaged, and thus she could not provide the records for the confirmed sales figures for each food stall at the close of business. Therefore, we can only accept that the records in the accounting system were correct.

The operating result of Lantern Night 2015 was a deficit of \$335. This included the cost of purchasing a few hundred T-shirts for volunteers at a cost of \$825. Only a few volunteers wore the T-shirts on the night of the event.

It is uncertain whether the ex-committee was also disappointed with this result. They should review their decision for the use of the valuable reserve of the 700 members, in a total amount of \$12,045 (from 13 May to 2 October 2015) for the employment of an ex-staff Ms Chan, one of whose major duties was to organise the Lantern Night. It is debatable as to whether the decision was a waste of valuable resources and whether or not this employment was essential.

#### Result of Bank Enquiry re a \$6,000 cheque

Following from the report in the 2015 Spring Newsletter, there has been some further investigation with respect to the \$6,000 cheque. In early November, our President and our Secretary approached ANZ Bank to enquire about this cheque. The copy of the cheque held by the bank indicated the

name of the payee was ex-president, Ken Yap, not the name of the printing company.

On 22 October 2015, after the current committee's endeavour to follow up, \$5,074 was refunded to the Association. The balance of \$926 was spent on the making of two banners for the Chinese Language School. Unfortunately, some of the information printed on the banners was incorrect and thus they could not be used. The amount of \$926 that the Association spent on making these two banners was ultimately wasted.

# Another issue relating to the 2014-15 financial statement

In the financial statement (for the year ending 30 June 2015) presented at the 2015 AGM, held on 29 August 2015, it indicated that the \$6,000 referred to above was "Cash On Hand" held by the Association. In fact, it was temporarily held by the ex-president, Mr. Ken Yap since 13 May 2015.

A group of people have criticised the current Committee for being too strict and picky. The current Committee's query of the last few years' accounts of the Association reflects the lack of trust in the operation of the ex-committee.

As discussed previously, the current committee has concerns about the employment of a staff member at a cost over market pay, particularly given the Association did not have an operating surplus at the time and the members' reserve had to be used. We must consider what the effect would be to the Association if the members' reserve is used without any proper control. The future of the Association is of great concern to the current committee and we want to ensure that the Association is acting in accordance with normal business practice. In particular, we want to ensure any use of the members' reserve is carefully considered. We are only dealing with the facts and have nothing to do with attacking anyone.

#### My role in the Association

Subject to the advice from my cardiologist and endocrinologist re "the importance of enjoying a relaxed retirement", I recently had a discussion with Alice Ho, the Assistant Treasurer about reducing the number of tasks I undertake. I would like to thank her for her assistance in taking over a number of tasks that are currently part of the Treasurer's role.

#### From the Editor's Desk

The year of the Ram finally comes to an end in a couple of weeks' time. It has been a turbulent year for the CCCA. With heavy losses financially up to and including the Lantern Night event of 2015, and a mass resignation of members of the management

committee newly elected in the 2015 AGM, the CCCA was in crisis. Fortunately, the remaining members on the management committee were able to co-opt five very able and experienced members into the management committee.

The new management committee, under the leadership of Mrs. Jenny Lau, is taking up the arduous task of setting the office, the records and the accounts right. I have every confidence that they will achieve what they set out to do. I have good reason to expect the CCCA will again be run with the help of volunteers as envisaged by the founders of the association twenty-seven years ago.

In consideration of ecology, from the next issue on, this newsletter will only be posted to members who have not registered an email address with us. Members, whose email addresses are registered with us, will be sent a link to the newsletter via email. I urge all members to give us their email addresses as soon as possible. We must do our part to reduce carbon emissions.

Our Chinese Language School, together with the Shaanxi Provincial Office of Overseas Chinese Affairs, will be holding the "Chinese Cultural Big Playground" camp during the Term 3 vacation in late September this year. Interested students should ask your teachers in our Chinese Language School.
